## Post-Harvey Fuel Shortage Rumors Create Panic

Who can forget the long lines for gas, or pumps with no gas last week as panic settled in after Hurricane Harvey damaged coastal refineries? Even though experts reassured customers that there was plenty of gas and that even where outages occurred it would only be temporary, the panic remained and most people frantically searched for an open pump and even waited in long lines to get some of the prized fuel.

Many stations reported long lines and frazzled nerves and that staff were needed to direct traffic and in some cases keep the peace. The processing of credit and debit card purchases slowed down the process and many customers found the card readers were not working, causing them to have to go into the store to make their gas purchases.

Another issue that led to the urgency was the probability of price gauging, which did end up occurring.

Flooding still remains in many areas along the coast and other inland areas. Cleanup and restoration could go on for some time, and it could take a while for gas prices to go back down.

It's hard to believe that yet another catastrophic hurricane is already on its way towards the mainland, specifically Florida. As of this writing, Irma is considered a Category 5 hurricane with winds already reaching 185 mph. Florida and other territories in the path of the storm are bracing for what could be a terrific blow.

It's going to be a rocky hurricane season, but what we have to remember is - the inconvenience of more expensive or hard-to-find gas pales in comparison to what so many in the aftermath of

**Travis County's Fire Marshal's Office Stresses Extreme Caution When Transporting/Storing Gasoline**

The Travis County Fire Marshal's Office would like to remind the community that the only safe way to transport and store gasoline is by using approved portable gas containers.

"In regard to the recent perception of a gasoline shortage, we strongly urge our community to be patient and not over react to the temporary change in gasoline supply to our area," said Travis County Chief Fire Marshal Tony Callaway. "More importantly, we want to make sure that when you do decide to purchase gasoline and other fuels, it is done in a safe manner that does not endanger your life or the lives of others. There have been reports in our area of people filling up buckets and other inappropriate containers with gasoline and other fuels.



This is not only dangerous, it is illegal."

Approved plastic gas containers are made of a special plastic that will not react with gasoline. These containers are red in color and will have an Underwriter's Laboratories (UL) or the American Society for Testing and Materials (ASTM) stamp on them.

To prevent problems at the pump, here are some safety guidelines for customers to follow when

filling gas containers:

Use only approved and properly labeled gasoline containers. The gas can should be red in color and have an Underwriter's Laboratories (UL) or the American Society for Testing and Materials (ASTM) stamp on them.

Place the container on the ground before filling to allow static build-up to dissipate. Make sure the filler nozzle touches the rim of the filler opening to help static electricity dissipate.

Fill the container only 95 percent full. Leave an air space so the fuel can expand as temperatures increase.

Always fill the can manually; never use the trigger lock on the nozzle.

Turn off your

car's motor before fueling and extinguish any cigarettes or open flames.

Never fill a container inside a vehicle or truck bed.

Wipe the can clean before putting it in the vehicle (or hose it off). Secure the can in the vehicle so it won't slide around.

Never leave a can in your vehicle for extended periods.

Don't breathe gasoline fumes. They are extremely harmful to your health.

It is not safe to fill unapproved plastic bottles, old metal cans, other metal containers or glass containers with gasoline. It is also against the law.

**Travis County Calls For November 7 Transportation and Parks Bond Election**

The Travis County Commissioners Court voted today to place two ballot initiatives for the November 7, 2017 election: a \$93.4M bond initiative for transportation and a \$91.5M bond initiative for parks and open spaces, for a total of \$185M of projects.

The transportation and road safety bond package includes projects that are predominantly in the eastern half of the county. The largest of these projects include Harold Green/Texas 130 to Austin's Colony Boulevard (\$10.7M); South Pleasant Valley Road from FM 1327 to Bradshaw Road, 1,000-foot south of River Plantation Drive (\$8.6M); and Thaxton Road from McKinney Falls Parkway to Sassman Road (\$6.1M).

The parks and

open spaces bond package enhances existing and adds new park facilities and increases Travis County's overall acreage in conservation. The package includes Bee Creek Sports Complex (\$21.2M); Onion Creek Greenway Improvements (\$9.5M); Northeast Metro Park Soccer Fields Improvements (\$7.5M) and conservation easements throughout the county (\$15M).

"This bond election is about the safety, mobility and quality of life of Travis County residents," said Travis County Judge Sarah Eckhardt. "We had a quality process with our Citizens Bond Advisory Committee, who did an amazing job in committing their time and listening to input. Now we look forward to our November 7 election."

## New Tech Middle School: A Manor Innovation Station

Librarian Karen Myers announces to a class of sixth graders how speed dating works. Perfectly suited to the New Tech Middle School style, "speed dating" is an inventive way for scholars to select reading material. First, the young readers choose three titles that catch their eye. Then they explore each book for one minute and choose one they'd like to check out.

Since exploring fiction is a current English Language Arts unit theme, every book featured in literary speed dating is fiction—and the selection spans far beyond the most popular titles. This activity encourages exploration of

the unfamiliar and helps scholars progress past snap judgments. It's parallel to what we're experiencing at New Tech as educators.

The library is a strong

reflection of the school as a whole. Most school libraries are quiet, closed-off, and conventional. This one is situated in an open space directly next to the cafeteria. Our scholars often "stop in their tracks because a great book caught their eye," share Myers. She continues, "We chat about books, which encourages conversations about their broader interests." These interactions allow for stronger relationship-building on a personal level.

Open-concept building design fosters connection that might not occur so frequently in a library with walls. Karen Myers has worked in education for twenty years, traveling as far as Korea to teach. Now she's fighting the old-fashioned stereotype of quiet school libraries as the ideal. She has become a proponent of the interaction, collaboration, and connection that occurs within a not-so-quiet Manor innovation station: our library.

## A Texas Poker Face In The Eye Of The Storm

For a week we've had a deep, sick feeling growing in our bellies. Forecasts grew steadily more ominous, the atmosphere still sweltering - as it has been since June - suddenly became thick with the anticipation of weather. Gelatinous, almost. By Thursday we had to push the air away it was so thick. Something was brewing. Something was coming. Something was spinning and growing and ready to spit fury just off the coast that sits some 120 miles to the south.

I've been afraid of weather since I can remember - probably because I'm from Texas and have the misfortune of an elephant's memory. At the age of five I distinctly remember the lights in kindergarten blinking, then dying against a storm that thrashed against the little school house windows. Even at that tender age I read the expressions of fear in my teachers' eyes as they ushered us into a hallway, whispered prayers under their breath. I remember their hands trembling as a tornado touched down nearby.

The sound of silence followed by chaos still resonates. I listen for it every spring. Life here is organized around the seasons and their various forms of fury. We accept this when we agree to

either move or stay here. It's a pact with the devil: you let us remain in this arguably still unsettled pocket of humanity that juts its chest out alongside the Mexican border - not entirely an American state - not entirely its own nation - but with the firm belief it has the right to claim autonomy (despite our proclivity and constant need for federal aid. Ahem..).

Even those of us who rage against the conservative independence that thrives here feel our blood course to the tune

of "The Eyes of Texas are Upon You." We can't help it. It's a drug in the water. It's a scent on the breeze. It's the vast expanse, the big (big) skies, the rough terrain, the rivers, the cattle, the nachos, the Lone Star. It is Us. It is Ours. It is Texas.

I was born here, I'm no transplant, although every summer and in the depths of tornado season, I threaten to pull up my thorny mesquite roots and leave - an empty threat because this is home. This is home. For better or worse.



Right now it's 8:15 pm on Aug. 27, 2017. 48 hours after a Category 4 hurricane slammed into a beautiful town on the gulf coast. 120 miles inland, it took the hurricane several hours to reach us and throughout the day yesterday the approach of this monster was evident as band after band of rain and wind grew stronger and steadier. By midnight the wind howled and the ancient elms that encircle our home thrashed and whipped against the windows. Within this historically unsteady atmosphere in central TX, at the convergence of west and east and south and north - we are no strangers to weather. But this.. this..unyielding rain - the intermittent tropical storm gusts that refuse to leave. The monster has parked just south of us, spinning and refueling from the coast, dumping more and more moisture over us. Tonight the windows are still pelted, and we've got towels shoved against them to keep the rain out. 48hours later. They're forecasting, in the best circumstance, another week of this water.

Years ago I would have spent this solemn Sunday curled on the couch around a warm beverage, watching movies and the news. Wearing pajamas from dusk to dawn. But I agreed to dispose of those luxuries when I bred my first goats and asked

them to produce milk for me. Asked them to keep those udders full every day for 10 months each year. In trade, I agreed to milk them twice daily - no matter what. No matter what. It was a marriage contract, really. In sickness and health - til death do us part. Normally it feels less dramatic, this agreement we made with each other. It's a chore that is, actually, the backbone of the business I'm trying to germinate. Right now - as the rain pelts sideways so it cuts (my arms bled last night on my walk home from the dairy) - it's no chore. It's a promise I am keeping. Right now - when I peel myself off the couch, force my body out of shelter into wind that's got trees bent horizontal - it's a duty I am fulfilling. Keeping the barn dry, the feeders full of fresh hay. It's the best I can do. I'm doing my best.

With that said: I will not for a single moment exaggerate our suffering. We are not suffering, not even a little. We have power, we are above water. Our animals are dry, our water is clean, our walls are standing - our roof is solid. I am beyond any words for the millions whose situation is much, much more serious.

And for the farmers in south east Texas and those on the coastal bend - the men and women who huddle over their herds and crops - watched them disintegrate and disap-

pear. For you, I am weeping and speechless. Your heart is our heart and our heart is Texas - with all of it's enormous faults. And enormous beauty.

On Friday evening we took the herd for a walk in the woods. I called it "the last supper" since the forecast warned it would be the last dinner out for our herd for a week. Maybe for weeks. The irony was palpable that after so many months of heat too intolerable to allow us to venture out, our first brief moments of reprieve came only hours before the bottom would fall out.

Even then, in the calm of that evening, the clouds to the south moved fast and were attached to the outer bands rolling in. I was nauseous with worry that night, sipping my yeti filled with bourbon, but I leaned against a goat and wore my best poker face against what was coming. It's what we do here. Paw at the ground, heads down, dig in, brace for impact. For all of you Texas farmers in the path of Harvey - you, like me, knew the risks, took the same solid vow to protect our stock and to show up - despite the weather. In solidarity, I send you all the strength I can spare, and I know no matter the outcome, you'll return to your roots - wherever they land - digging into this Texas soil that inexplicably keeps us coming back, keeps us here. Stay strong.

## Ergon Applies For Permit To Discharge Waste Water Into Wilbarger Creek

Ergon has built a hot asphalt plant near Manor in the Austin ETJ on 13811 Old Highway 20. The facility is an asphalt and polymerized asphalt storage facility and terminal that brings in asphalt via rail, mixes the asphalt with various chemicals to meet specifications of the customers and then is shipped out via truck.

As a result, train and gravel/asphalt trucks going to and from the plant have increased.

Ergon has applied to the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TECQ) for

proposed Texas Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (TPDES) Permit No WQ000f229000 (EPA i.D. No. TX0137731) to authorize the discharge of treated wastewater at a volume not to exceed a daily average flow of 133,000 gallons per day.

The permit is available for viewing at the Manor Library 601 W. Carrie Manor Street. Further information may also be obtained from Ergon Asphalt & Emulsions, Inc. by calling Mr. Zachary Golson at 601-933-3558.

The plant has

been putting out fumes into the area which you can smell in most of Manor depending on wind direction. Now they are asking for a permit to expel waste water into the Wilbarger Creek which flows into the Colorado river.

The Colorado is a drinking source for many cities and towns including Austin and Manor as well as those down stream to the coast. Manor has two other sources of water from natural springs including Manville Water (ground water) Coupland, Tx

- Blue Water (ground water) Cross County Water Supply Burleson, Tx
- Colorado River Alluvium Aquifer

Ranchers water their stock in Wilbarger Creek and also use it to irrigate crops. The waste water will have a slurry of toxic chemicals in it. The flow will not go directly to the Colorado river but will have some overflow going into a wetlands area. Wilbarger Creek Alliance and Manor residents are fighting the permit.



## THIS WEEK IN ASTRONOMY

Mars to Appear in Morning Show with Mercury, Regulus, and Venus

Sunrise this week moves from about 7:11 to 7:15am as the days get shorter. Civil twilight begins about a half hour before that.

Look due east about 6:30am and you will see a bright planet Venus about 20 degrees off the horizon. Constellation Leo (the Lion) is rising just below. Regulus, the brightest star in Leo, is about 6 or 7 degrees up by this time if your eastern horizon is clear. Planets Mercury and Mars appear right near Regulus.

Morning of Saturday September 9th, Mercury is just above and right of Regulus. Day by day, Regulus will rise higher over Mercury, which will appear to march in place for a couple of weeks before diving back towards the Sun. On the morning of the 10th, Mercury will be



just barely to the right of Regulus.

Mars, however, will continue to rise higher day by day, and will actually appear to meet with Mercury on the morning of September 16th. This meeting is called a "conjunction", and doesn't happen very often.

But wait! An even better conjunction is on the way! Over the next month, Mars will appear to approach Venus

in the sky, into conjunction the morning of October 5th. Photographers who find a clear eastern horizon by 6:30am will see the bright pair 11 degrees above due east.

To make the show just one step better: On the morning of September 18 at 6:30am, look east and see (from top to bottom) Venus, the Moon, Mars, and Mercury all lined up within 10 degrees of each other.



## RECIPE OF THE WEEK

### Easy, Crispy Beer Battered Fish Fillets

By Juliette Exupery

Our favorite ~ Serves 4

Swai fish is a well kept secret. The taste is delicate and rich and very similar to Orange Roughy, which was over-fished and banned a few years ago. Our family prefers Swai to Tilapia.

- 1/2 c. cornstarch
- 1 1/2 tsp. baking powder
- 3/4 tsp. salt
- 1/2 tsp. Creole seasoning
- 1/4 tsp. paprika
- 1/4 tsp. cayenne pepper

- 1/4 c. flour divided
- Scant 1/2 c. milk
- 1/3 cup beer
- 2 cups crushed saltines
- 4 fish fillets
- Generous oil for frying

Salt and pepper the fish fillets.

Combine first 6 ingred and 1/2 c. flour in a shallow bowl. Stir in milk & beer until smooth. Place crackers and remaining 3/4 c. flour in 2 separate shallow bowls. Coat fish pieces lightly with flour, then dip in batter and coat with cracker crumbs.

Heat oil to 375°

in an electric skillet or deep pot. Fry fish in batches for 2 to 3 minutes on each side, or until golden brown.

Drain on paper towels. Serve with your favorite sauce.

Note: To crush the crackers I break them up and pulse them in a food processor to prevent the coating from becoming too thick and chunky.



## THIS WEEK IN HISTORY

### September 8, 1565

The first Catholic settlement in America was founded by Spaniard Don Pedro Menendez de Aviles at St. Augustine, Florida. St. Augustine would go on to become the oldest surviving European settlement in America.

### September 8, 1900

A hurricane with winds of 120 mph struck Galveston, Texas, killing over 8,000 persons, making it the worst natural disaster in U.S. history. The hurricane and tidal wave that followed destroyed over 2,500 buildings.

### September 9, 1776

The United States came into existence as the Continental Congress changed the name of the new American nation from the United Colonies.

### September 11, 2001

The worst terrorist attack in U.S. history occurred as four large passenger jets were hijacked then crashed, killing nearly 3,000 persons. Two fully-fueled jumbo jets, American Airlines Flight 11 carrying 92 people and United Airlines Flight 175 carrying 65 people were diverted by the hijackers to New York City where they were piloted into the twin towers of the World Trade Center. The impact and subsequent fire caused both 110-story towers to collapse, killing 2,752 persons including hundreds of rescue workers and people employed in the towers. Flight 77 with 64 people on board was diverted to Washington, D.C., then piloted into the Pentagon building, killing everyone on board and 125 military personnel inside the building. Flight 93 with 44 people on board was also diverted toward Washington but passengers attempted to overpower the terrorists on board.

### September 13, 1814

The Battle of Fort Henry in Baltimore Harbor occurred, observed by Francis Scott Key aboard a ship. He watched the British attack overnight and at dawn saw the American flag still flying over the fort, inspiring him to write the verses which were later coupled with the tune of a popular drinking song and became the U.S. National Anthem.
