Manor MAP Campus Disturbance

On September 14th at 1:10 PM Manor Police Officers were called to the Manor MAP Campus at 600 E Parsons St in Manor because of a physical disturbance between a student and the principal. When officers arrived at the school the school staff had the student, identified as 17 year old Osifo Cameron, restrained on the ground. As officers assisted by handcuffing Osifo, several other students (two 15 year-old juvenile students and three adult students, 17 year-old Alexis Rosales, 18 year-old Javon Clark, 17 year-old Janishi Coleman) began to interfere and were placed in handcuffs for the safety of officers, school staff, and the students.

told that the incident started when a school bus arrived to pick up students to take them to lunch. Osifo was told he was not allowed on the bus, but



insisted that he get on the bus causing a disturbance. MAP principal Dr. Jones attempted to talk Osifo down and stood in between Osifo and the bus door. Osifo attempted to push past Dr. Jones and became physical with her, including

throwing punches. Dr. Jones sustained minor injuries and was evaluated by EMS and Fire Personnel, but did not go to the hospital. The students were evaluated as precautionary measures by EMS and Fire Personnel. No students were transported to the hospital.

The five additional students were charged with Interference with Public Duties. Osifo Cameron was charged with Assault on a Public Servant - Felony.

The Manor Police, Travis County Sheriff's Office, and school staff all worked together to make sure this incident did not get out of hand and helped maintain control of the school. Travis County EMS and Travis County Fire arrived on scene for evaluations.

NOTICE OF TAX REVENUE INCREASE

The Travis County Emergency Services District No. 12 conducted public hearings on September 6, 2016 and September 13, 2016 on a proposal to increase the total tax revenues of Travis County Emergency Services District No. 12 from properties on the tax roll in the preceding year by 10.253 percent.

The total tax revenue proposed to be raised last year at last year's tax rate of \$.10 for each \$100 of taxable value was \$1,404,057.37.

Travis County Sheriff's Office Detectives have identified two additional men as persons they strongly suspect are victims of homicide in an incident that took place at 8301 Linden Rd. sometime in the early morning hours of September 8, 2016.

BRIAN LEE SATTERFIELD, 41 of Bastrop are suspected of being at the scene of the incident along with Matthew Aaron Barber who is a resident of the address. Travis County Sheriff's Office was dispatched at 5:54 am Thursday September 8, 2016 to assist Travis County Fire Rescue at a structure fire. Detectives from TCSO were

dispatched to the scene when it was determined that there was at least one deceased person in the home.

A total of four victims are currently with the Travis County Medical Examiner's Office and their investigation into cause of death and identification is underway. TCSO is working the case as a homicide. All four victims have

wounds inconsistent with a fire. Detectives worked late into the evening last night and have been busy today following up on leads.

THIS WEEK IN ASTRONOMY NASA Spacecraft To Chase Asteroid

On September 8th, NASA launched an unmanned spacecraft named OSIRIS REx. Its mission is to travel to an asteroid named Bennu, study the asteroid, collect a sample, and return to Earth. Children born this month will be celebrating their seventh birthday by the time the spacecraft returns. Scientists believe that Bennu is made of material from the early formation of our solar system, material which has not been changed by geologic forces nor chemical reactions. Thus, it could reveal much information about how the Sun and planets were formed. Also, if it contains traces of water or organic molecules, it could explain how some of those materials arrived on Earth after our home planet cooled from its fiery origin. Back here in Manor, the summer stars are



beginning to give way to autumn's constellations, such as Pegasus, Andromeda, and Cassiopeia. The Big Dipper sets early, and Scorpius is down by midnight. In the east, the "Great Square of Pegasus," an asterism that looks like a huge but slightly off-kilter square, rises high in the east before midnight.


If you're out before dawn (before

7am), you can get a preview of winter's evening starscape. Taurus (The Bull) is nearly straight overhead, with Orion (The Hunter) and Canis Major (The Big Dog) below to the southeast. Gemini (The Twins) is high over the eastern horizon.

The Moon is full on Friday September 16. It is near the closest point in its orbit to Earth (or "perihelion", which happens on September 18), so it may appear a bit larger than usual.

Venus is still very bright, and visible just after sunset, low in the west. Mars and Saturn are still easy to spot in the evening, above Scorpius (The Scorpion) in the south-southwest. Jupiter is no longer visible as it is lost in the glare of the Sun.

Joseph Macry studied astronomy at UT Austin, and is a member of Austin Astronomical Society.

290 East to the Wildhorse Ranch subdivision. He also stated that construction will occur at SH 130/Parmer Lane in the near future and will have a "big box" store, office space, apartments and condos. No start date or the official name of the big box store was announced however.

Other projects currently coordinated by Dwyer Realty include the Lagos Subdivision located on FM 973 which will contain 12 interconnected lakes. 9/11 Wounds Still Raw After 15 Years

This past Sunday was a day of remembrance to honor the fallen and their families whose lives were most deeply affected by the 9/11 attacks on our country fifteen years ago. Americans across the land paused to remember the lost and to pay tribute to those who worked so valiantly in the rescue and recovery

the combined attacks on New York City, the Pentagon and the downing of the fourth plane in Pennsylvania. As a result, the United States crafted and implemented a strong strategic plan to combat this "terrorism". Newly elected president George W. Bush now faced what would be the defining issue of his presidency.

Millions of Americans and peo-

What do you say to a country that has just experienced such devastating events? President Bush, who had been in an airplane most of the day because of security concerns, and the only plane that was allowed in the air during that time, eventually returned to the White House. At 9 p.m.

On the morning of September 11, 2001, 19 militants who were associated with al-Qaeda, an Islamic extremist group, executed a well-planned hijack of four American airplanes and successfully carried our suicide attacks against several U.S. targets. The first attack

involved two planes that were intentionally flown into the World Trade Center towers in New York City, ultimately causing the collapse of both towers. A third plane crashed into the Pentagon located just outside of Washington, D.C. The fourth, which was meant for Washington D.C. was diverted to Pennsylvania when passengers decided overthrow the hijackers. Unfortunately, in doing so, the plane would crash into a field in Pennsylvania. These brave souls who were on the fourth plane are lauded as heroes today.

These horrific attacks resulted in massive death and destruction, the worst in American history. Over 3,000 people were killed in

and the targets, 343 firefighters and paramedics, 24 New York City police officers and 37 Port Authority police officers lost their lives as they struggled to evacuate and save office workers and Trade Center visitors. Only six people in the collapse of the towers survived. Almost 10,000 others were treated for injuries, many of which were se-

Want to Retire Early? Start Planning Now

The average American retires at about age 63, according to data from the U.S. Census Bureau. If you enjoy your work, of course, you may want to go well beyond that age. But what if you don't want to wait until 63 or so? Can you afford to retire early?

Possibly – if you follow these suggestions:

Research the costs involved. What will you do during your retirement years? Will you travel the world or stay close to home, pursuing your hobbies? Will you downsize from your current home? How will you pay for health care until you're old enough for Medicare? You will need to answer these and other questions to determine how much you will need to sustain a comfortable lifestyle as an early retiree.

Invest more – and invest for growth. One big advantage in retiring at the usual age, or even later, is that it gives you more time to invest. But if you're determined to retire early, you will almost certainly need to accelerate your investment rate – which, in practical terms, means you'll likely have to

contribute more each year to your IRA and 401(k) or similar employer-sponsored retirement plan than if you were going to retire later on. Plus, you may have to "ratchet up" the growth potential of your investment portfolio. However, because growth-oriented investments typically are more volatile than other investments, you will be taking on more risk than you might otherwise. If you are truly uncomfortable with this risk level, you may need to re-evaluate your plans for retiring early.

Cut down your debt load. It's always a good idea to enter retirement with as few debts as possible – but if you want to retire early, you may need to be even more diligent in controlling your debt load.

Know the rules governing retirement plan withdrawals. If you want to retire before age 59½ and begin taking distributions from your IRA or 401(k) plan, you will generally be subject to a 10% early distribution penalty, plus normal income taxes. (To withdraw your earnings from a Roth IRA tax and penalty free, you generally must have owned the account for at least five

years and have reached age 59½. You can withdraw your contributions at any time tax and penalty free.) However, you may be able to avoid the 10% penalty if you take "substantially equal periodic payments," which are calculated based upon your age and other factors. Once these distributions begin, they must continue for five years or until you reach age 59½, whichever is longer. Other rules apply to these distributions, so before taking any, you will want to consult with your tax and financial professionals. And keep in mind that if your withdrawal rate is too high, you risk seriously depleting your retirement accounts, especially if your investments decline in value during the years you're taking these payments.

Most importantly, do everything early: Plan early, invest early (and don't stop), and lower your debt load early. Getting a jump on all these activities can go a long way toward turning your early retirement dreams into reality.



One of the many reasons I recommend people practice yoga is to help them feel grounded. But what does being grounded mean, and why is it important?

Being grounded can also be described as feeling centered or in your body. It's important to feel this way, because when we don't, it's very easy to become stressed or anxious when things don't go as planned. I like to use the analogy of roots. If you think of a tumbleweed that isn't connected to the ground, it's easily tossed around by even small breezes. But when you think of oak trees and their strong, deep root systems, they often stay grounded even after intense storms.

The more we feel grounded within ourselves, the more capable we are of handling and coping with crisis, which is an inevitable part of life. Feeling grounded allows us to be present to what's happening in the moment, knowing that that's really all we can control.

If you're feeling a little disconnected, here are some ways I like to practice being grounded (besides yoga, that's a given):

1. Tidy up. It may sound crazy, but the act of cleaning itself can often almost be a form of meditation. You are usually very focused on the task at hand, making any other worries about the past or future melt

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

Mustangs Clawed By The Hawks 40-17


